

YOUNG BULGARIAN BY NO MEANS A SPY

Man Arrested on Bridge Merely Fined for Trespassing

While the young Bulgarian arrested on the Vaudreuil bridge on Friday night was condemned to pay five dollars and costs for trespassing on the railway tracks, the letters found on his person and addressed to various parts of Europe turned out to be perfectly innocent, and had been given him by various friends to post at his earliest convenience.

The young man, Vassil Kaluf, appeared in the Enquete Court for sentence yesterday morning, but in hearing the circumstances of the case, the magistrate decided that there was little reason to fear the alleged spying on the prisoner's part, and condemned him to a slightly larger fine than that usually given for the offence of trespassing.

Another foreigner, Gregory Zaruck, a native of Austria, was arrested by

a charge of stabbing a Russian, John Louis by name, about ten days ago. Zaruck was found in a pool room with a number of his compatriots, and when told that a constable was in the room, made a movement to his pocket. The constable was there first, and drew a long hunting-knife from Zaruck's pocket. The prisoner made no resistance, as the deputy high constable threatened to shoot if there was any trouble. Zaruck appeared immediately for arraignment, pleaded not guilty, and was remanded for enquete on Friday.

MILITIAMEN IN COURT.

In the recorder's court, two more militiamen appeared yesterday charged with drunkenness, and were given the option of standing a trial in the ordinary criminal courts or appearing before a court martial for the offence against one of the most elementary rules of military discipline. Both men chose the latter and were allowed by the Recorder to be dealt with by the military authorities.

A third militiaman who was charged with damaging a taxicab to the extent of three dollars, was forced to make good the damage and pay the costs of the case. The chauffeur of the taxicab told the court that the soldier was drunk. The prisoner denied this part of the evidence but admitted that he had had a few drinks.
