

HAMILTON AUSTRINIANS CALLED TO THE COLORS

Complete List of Reservists Furnished by Consul

A LARGE ESTATE LEFT

Nine of Donald Smith's Nearest Relatives Receive More Than \$12,000 Each—Record in Stock Sales—Chinese Refused Laundry Licenses.

Hamilton, July 30.—Louis Lefkowitz, an Austro-Hungarian interpreter, has received official notification from the Austro-Hungarian Consul at Montreal to notify the 1,200 Austro-Hungarians residing in and around Hamilton to hold themselves in readiness to depart for the homeland within 48 hours, leaving work and families here. An indication of the rigid military system of Austria is that a complete list of the reservists here was supplied to the interpreter by the Consul this afternoon.

The police have ten extra men in the northeast corner of the city, where Austro-Hungarians and Serbs have congregated their homes, but no disorder has taken place.

Large Estate.

Donald Smith left an estate valued at \$114,854 to be divided among eighteen relatives, nine of whom are close relatives and receive over \$12,000 each. He left \$500 to the Roman Catholic Diocese and \$500 to the Sisters of St. Joseph. His estate consists of real estate and mortgage loans.

Let Old Ladies on the Lawn.
