While the Police Will Make Further Search. After making a thorough search

of the house of Henry Geercke, a German, who conducts a general

store about a quarter of a mile north of the Halfway House in Kingston road, Detective Charles Taylor and County Constable Burns discovered ninety-six sticks of dynamite hidden in a wicker basket a few inches below the ground in the cellar. Geercke was placed under arrest, charged with having explosives in his possession and the dynamite was conveyed to the Stanley Barracks in the police patrol wagon. Disquieting rumors and a report furnished the police by

a neighbor of Geercke, led to the search and the seizure. County Con-stable Burns investigated and then called upon Inspector Kennedy of the Detective Department.
"I sent Detective Taylor down yesterday afternoon to assist Burns in making a search of the house. The dynamite was discovered and Geercke placed under arrest," said Inspector Kennedy. "Were there any papers found in Geercke's possession that would indicate that he was an agent of
