

# ARTILLERY ENTRAINS AT KINGSTON FOR CAMP

## R.C.H.A. Goes to Valcartier 247 Strong, 8 Guns

### FINE CLASS OF VOLUNTEERS

**Canals Are Fully Guarded—Fort Henry in Care of the 14th Regiment—Women Making Good Progress With Hospital Ship Fund.**

Kingston, Aug. 13.—At 8 o'clock this evening the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery left here for Valcartier Camp, Quebec, and thousands of people cheered them to the echo as the C. P. R. trains carrying them pulled out of the station. The brigade consists of 247 officers and men, 176 horses and 8 guns. Lieut.-Col. Henri Panet commands. Other members of the staff are: Major J. E. Mills, Captain H. E. Boak, Adjutant; Captain C. F. Constantine, and Lieut. W. Gimblett.

The officers of "A" Battery are: Major J. N. F. Leslie, Captain W. H. P. Elkins, Lieut. F. F. Benson and Lieut. H. W. Macpherson.

"B" Battery: Major D. I. V. Eaton, Captain W. G. Haggerty, Lieut. H. P. Lafferty. Lieut. C. V. Bishop is at present in the hospital suffering from a dislocated shoulder and cannot join the battery till later.

As the R. C. H. A. guard has been taken off Fort Henry, a detachment of the 14th Regiment was put on those old fortifications to-night.

#### Enlisting at Tamworth.

Tamworth, Aug. 13.—Captain Johnston Hannah of the 47th Regiment was here yesterday enlisting for overseas service. He says he has no trouble in getting plenty of men to enlist. He has a large number ready now to go to Halifax. He also wants a number of good sound horses. He was here again this week looking for men and horses.

#### Twenty-seven From Grimsby.

Grimsby, Aug. 13.—Col. Fraser of the 2nd Dragoons, Major Brooks of "Fighting B" squadron, and Dr. Kappelle, examining officer, arrived in Grimsby about 4 o'clock yesterday to examine the forty-six men enlisted here for the first Canadian contingent. The doctor had time to examine only twenty-four of the men, and he passed twenty-one, including two officers and three non-commissioned officers. The remaining twenty-two men are much disappointed at not being examined and if found fit accepted.

It is understood that Lieut. Johnson and five men from H. Company, 44th Regiment, of Grimsby, have passed the examination and will be with the first lot. They are now on duty on the Welland Canal. The total number from Grimsby will be twenty-seven, some of whom have seen service in Africa. Drilling will commence to-morrow night.

#### Officers Offer Regiment.

Cornwall, Aug. 13.—At a meeting of the officers of the 59th Regiment the following resolution was passed: "That this regiment express its willingness and desire to serve the Empire in the present crisis in any way that may be desired by the military authorities of Canada." Three companies of the regiment are now used guarding Cornwall Canal.

#### Fund Started in Twin Cities.

Berlin, Ont., Aug. 13.—Princess of Wales Chapter, Daughters of the Empire, and the Graduate Nurses' Association of this city, have started a campaign to raise funds for the Canadian hospital ship. The Daughters of the Empire started the subscription with \$100, and leading citizens of Berlin and Waterloo have affixed their names with substantial amounts. In addition, arrangements are being made to raise a considerable sum in small amounts, thus giving the general populace an opportunity to assist. Five nurses of the twin cities have volunteered to perform Red Cross duty at the war.

#### Fine Class of Men Offering.

Montreal, Aug. 13.—(C. P. Despatch.)—The opening of a recruiting station for the Princess Patricia Light Infantry Regiment at 596 St. Catherine street west was followed by a large influx of recruits, and those that were enrolled were described to-day by the recruiting officer as a fine class of men. More than fifty have already been passed, while as many have been turned down because of bad eyesight, etc.

Most of the men who have enlisted are ex-service men, but there are quite a number of Canadians who have been in the volunteers, and several are French-Canadians.

#### Chicago Scotsman Accepted.

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—Many offers are being received here from men in the United States who are willing to go to the front with the Canadian militia. This morning George Fernie, a resident of Chicago, and a well-known golf expert and teacher, reported at one of the recruiting stations and was accepted. Fernie is a native of Scotland, but has been in the United States for some time.

#### Brantford's Tag Day.

Brantford, Aug. 13.—With every enthusiasm for the cause in which they are working, and with a most cordial reception from the citizens and visitors, the women's organizations of the city, marshalled into line by the officers of Brant Chapter, I.O. D.E., to-day started to raise \$2,500 as Brantford's share of the Canadian women's contribution to the British navy in the form of a hospital ship. A tag day was held, and though the results were not totalled up, more than 7,000 tags and 500 pennants were sold.

#### Canals Fully Guarded.

Cornwall, Aug. 13.—(C. P. Despatch.)—The military guard on the canals in this district is now thoroughly organized, under command of Lieut.-Col. MacDonald, who is in charge of the section between Cardinal and Cornwall. The following companies are on duty:

Three companies of the 59th Stormont and Glengarry Regiment, two companies of the 56th Grenville Regiment, two companies of the 4th Hussars of Prescott. The officers and men are now all under canvas, with complete camp equipment. Colonel MacDonald's headquarters are at Morrisburg, which is the most central point.

Montreal, Aug. 13.—(C. P. Despatch.)—Representatives from all the

women's societies and clubs of Montreal met to-day at the Y. W. C. A. to consider the best means of assisting the war funds of Canada and to elect representatives to sit on the Montreal Patriotic Fund Committee. It was decided that the following societies should be officially represented: The Victorian Order of Nurses, the Montreal Women's Club, Canadian Club, Local Council of Women and the Daughters of the Empire.

#### \$800 From Oakville.

Oakville, Aug. 13.—The committees appointed to canvass Oakville for funds for the hospital ship completed their labors to-day. The sum subscribed by the ladies of this town totalled about \$800, and the workers are delighted with the result of their efforts.

#### 36th Ordered to Report.

Oakville, Aug. 13.—The following regimental order has been issued in accordance with orders from headquarters: "All officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the 36th Regiment overseas contingent who have passed the medical inspection will report without delay at the regimental orderly room, 333 High Park avenue, Toronto, for instructional purposes. Pay and subsistence at authorized militia rate will be allowed. Volunteers will be accepted until orders for mobilization at Valcartier are issued. By order, "A. J. McCausland, "Captain, acting Adjutant."
