

SUSPECTED GERMAN SPIES BEING BROUGHT TO KINGSTON

The four Germans who were arrested in Gananoque on Wednesday, August 12th, on suspicion of being spies, will be brought to Kingston this evening and placed in charge of the military authorities.

On Tuesday six men and one non-commissioned officer of the 14th Regiment, with Sergt. Wolfe, of the R.C. H.A., went down on the noon train to Gananoque, where they will take the men in charge. Sergt. Wolfe, who is sergeant of the permanent military police, is taking no chances with the men, and for that reason he took four pairs of heavy handcuffs which will be placed on the men while they are being brought to the city.

Chief Ryan, of the Gananoque police force, when called on long-distance telephone by the Whig, stated that he did not know what would be done with the men. He had received orders from Ottawa on Tuesday morning to hand the men over to the Kingston military authorities. There is no room in the police quarters in that town.

It will be remembered that these four men, when arrested, were heavily armed. They are supposed to have come from Clayton, N.Y.

The men will arrive in Kingston at about 7.45 o'clock this evening, and will likely be placed in the cells at Fort Henry, which will be closely guarded.
