
FOUR MAIL STEAMERS ARRIVE.

All Came at Same Time on Account of War.

One result of the present war was the arrival of four British mails yesterday, which were brought over by the steamers Teutonic, Tunisian, Virginian and Laconia,

There were thirty-eight bags of letters, which is by no means a record. The sacks of newspapers totalled five hundred and twenty-six.

No mail will now be accepted for Germany, Austria-Hungary or Luxemburg, or any that have to pass through these countries. All such letters and parcels will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

BRAND NEW TRAIN SERVICE.

Commencing to-day through passenger train service is being operated between Toronto and Ottawa over the new line of the Canadian Northern Railway, this service being daily except Sunday, trains arriving and departing from the Central Station, Ottawa, which is located in the heart of the city. New equipment is used throughout, consisting of electric-lighted coaches and cafe parlor cars.

The opening of this new line provides a service between Toronto, Ottawa, Richmond, Smith's Falls, Brockville, Portland, Chaffey's Locks, all points on the Rideau Lakes, and stations on the Brockville, Westport & Northwestern Railway, in addition to Napanee, Belleville, Trenton, Brighton, Cobourg, Port Hope and Oshawa, which points are now served by the double daily except Sunday, and the very convenient week-end service of the Canadian Northern Railway.
