MORE SUSPECTS COME WINDSOR SENT NINE TO FORT HEXBY WEDNESDAY.

Were Austrians and Were Regarded as Unsate-Montreal Likely to Send Big Batch. There are now twenty-six suspects

in confinement at Fort Henry. The last to arrive were nine from Wind-sor on Wednesday evening. When the evening train arrived from the

the evening train arrived from the west an armed guard in charge of the men got off the train at the outer station and proceeded to Fort Henry with the priconers. It is stated that the nine mea who are

Austrians were arrested in Windsor were not as it was feared that they safe to be at large. Up until Wednesday there were seventeen men in confinement.

Twelve of that number came from Sarnia on Tuesday evening. One came from Pembroke on Tuesday afternoon while the other four men

were gathered in some weeks ago by the chief of police at Gananoque. The military heads expect that about eighty men will be brought

up from Montreal on Thursday evening and placed in the fort.

There is plently of room to keep all the men that the militia department desires to send to the city. It

is understood that it is the intention of the authorities to keep four or

five men in each room. There ap-pears to be no reason why any of the men should complain as the

rooms which they are locked up in at the fort are a great deal better than some of the men have been accustomed to. The meals are good and each man is furnished with a

good spring matress. It is understood the militia de-partment will keep a number of the members of the 14th regiment on

members or the 1sta regiment on duty at Fort Henry until the war is over as a very close watch must be kept on the foreigners. The quar-ters which will be occupied by the riflemen are to be overhauled and

Mill be put in first-class condition.

Many of the men who did duty at
Fort Henry in 1885 can well remember the big time they had during the winter months.

The militia department will be in close touch with J. H. Berger, the ex-German officer released on Tues-day afternoon. Before this man was allowed out on parole he was

forced to sign papers to the effect that he would report to the militia authorities at stated periods. Failauthornies at stated periods. Fail-ing to do this he is liable to serious punishment. On Wednesday Ber-ger was at the armouries and had a talk with some of the heads. It is understood that he has been forbid-

den to leave Canada while the war

is in progress.
