that the present quarters were too
crowded, and since none of the prisoners of war seemed anxious to relinguish free board and logeing his

linquish free board and lodging by giving their parole not to undertake any hostile action against Great Britain, it became necessary to the better permanent quarters. Fort Henry is stated to be an excellent location for this concentration, as it is situated on a peninsula between two bays, which makes it very easy to guard, while giving the necessary opportunity to the misoners for exercise. The war ori-

soners will be sent to Kingston in a couple of special cars, escorted by armed guards, and the collection of further hostiles here will go on. Major Dale continuing his duties as
