

TO MOVE WAR PRISONERS

Hostiles Will Be Concentrated at Fort Henry, Near King- ston

Some time this week-end the eighty or more German and Austrian prisoners of war who are now confined at the Immigration Building on St. Antoine street will be transferred to Fort Henry at Kingston. The exact day and time of departure is not announced, since the military authorities are not anxious to have a crowd of hostile friends of the prisoners watching their removal.

For some time it had been found that the present quarters were too crowded, and since none of the prisoners of war seemed anxious to relinquish free board and lodging by giving their parole not to undertake any hostile action against Great Britain, it became necessary to find better permanent quarters.

Fort Henry is stated to be an excellent location for this concentration, as it is situated on a peninsula between two bays, which makes it very easy to guard, while giving the necessary opportunity to the prisoners for exercise. The war prisoners will be sent to Kingston in a couple of special cars, escorted by armed guards, and the collection of further hostiles here will go on. Major Dale continuing his duties as Provost Marshal.
