

CAMPAIGN AGAINST GERMAN-MADE GOODS

Strongly Urged by Sir William Mulock
at Opening of National Exhibition
at Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—That Canadians should not let themselves be stampeded in the big European conflict into any feeling of discontent, was the keynote of the official opening of the Canadian National exhibition, conducted by Sir John Gibson, this afternoon.

At the same time an appeal was added by Sir William Mulock, an appeal that the Canadian buying and consuming public should discriminate against German made goods of all classes and that they should seize this opportunity to develop their own manufacturers in all the greater proportion.

"Until the German people have once more on the confidence of the civilized world," said Sir William, "Canada ought to shut her markets to everything German. Other nations would follow suit, and then Germany's trade would be crippled into a condition where she would be forced to realize the folly of her great crime."

Mayor Hocken declared that not a single item of public work which had been planned by the city would be dropped.
