

# GERMANY WILL EXCHANGE LISTS OF PRISONERS

## LETTERS AND MONEY ORDERS TO BE SENT TO BRITISH CAP- TIVES IN GERMANY.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

London, Sept. 18.—The Official Press Bureau says the Government has received information that the German Government is prepared to communicate lists of British prisoners in their hands in return for similar information as to German prisoners here.

It is contemplated that such lists, which will include information as to the physical condition of the prisoners, will be interchanged periodically.

Arrangements are also being made for the transmission to Germany of letters, parcels and money orders for prisoners.

The German Government intends to permit correspondence between British prisoners and their friends in Britain.

The Austrian Government, it is also announced, intends to grant similar facilities with regard to prisoners in its hands.

Paris, Sept. 18.—The French and German Governments are arranging through Washington for the exchange of prisoners of war. It is understood that James W. Gerard, the American Ambassador to Germany, has cabled Germany's adhesion to the plan.

## FLEW ROUMANIAN FLAG.

### German Vessel Could Not Elude Cap- ture, Though.

Paris, Sept. 18.—A Marseilles despatch to the Havas Agency says:

"A French crew brought into port yesterday a cargo boat that had just been captured in the Mediterranean. The ship flew the Roumanian flag when captured, but in reality it is a German vessel."
