ent or license may be granted to more than one manufacturer. All that the manufacturer has to prove to the satisfaction of the Commissioner is that said patent or license is the property of a subject of a State at war with his Majesty, that

his decision is paramount as to whore patents shall be avoided or suspended or not, and he will be able to follow the dictates of his own judgment concerning the advisability of any step in such connection.

Follows British Act.

The Act has been drawn up much upon the same lines as the Orders

and Regulations Concerning Patents in force in Great Britain, and contains clauses by which the Commissioner may at any time during the continuance of these regulations, extend the time prescribed by the Pattend the time prescribed by the Pat-

ent Act for doing any act or filing any document, if the patentee was prevented by reason of active service or enforced absence from his coun-

try or any other circumstance arising from the present state of war, which, in the opinion of the Commissioner would justify such extension.

The Commissioner may also refuse to register assignment of any patent made by a subject of any State at war with Great Britain un-

less satisfied that such assignment was made in good faith and not for the purpose of evading any of the provisions of the War Measures Protection Act.
