35,000 Out of Work. Mr. D. F. Hall was of the opinion that there were about 35,000 men in Toronto willing to work, but unable to get it. He complained that not more than about seven hundred of these had volunteered for the house-to-house canvars.

That unemployment in the city had been more pronounced before the war than had been usual at this time of the year was a statement made by Mr. S. W. Dean, of the Fred Victor Misston. He volunteered to provide workers who would canvass a thousand houses. Over five hundred cards were signed

by unemployed last night while two hundred offered to act as canvassers.
