

TENEMENT FULL OF FOREIGNERS IS DYNAMITED

Montreal Suggests Concentration Camp for Alien Enemies to Prevent Such Outrages.

MONTREAL, Oct. 21.—As a result of the dynamite explosion here last night in a tenement house occupied by nearly 100 foreigners, a concentration camp may be established about Montreal for those of all nationalities opposed to the allies. It is understood an appeal will be made to the federal government to establish such camps at once.

Were Never Deported.

It was made known today that 200 German and Austrians, who had been ordered deported, never left the city and are at large. The outbreak of war prevented their deportation and it is claimed they were not held. Acting Mayor VanDeliac also has ordered the police to round up all foreigners and seize all weapons found upon them or in their houses.

The body of the ^N man found in the ruins of the house at 573 Frontenac street last night after the explosion, was identified this morning as that of Peter Dichtara, 571 Frontenac street, a Russian, who had only been a short time in this country. He leaves a widow and four children in Russia. The other victim of the explosion was Mrs. Morris Jumisky, aged 35, who died at the Notre Dame hospital of her injuries.

Sam Buss, aged 29, is dying of injuries to his back and head. Nine others received minor injuries. Police and fire department officials fear there are at least four more bodies in the ruins, but no search can be conducted at present because of the danger of falling walls and broken gas pipes.

The police are open in their belief that the explosion was due to a bomb and that the trouble arose through racial differences caused by the war.

They hold 13 persons as witnesses and are hunting for the two men alleged to have been seen carrying a valise in the building just before the explosion.
