

SOLDIERS TO MOBILIZE WHEN OUTFITS COME

Expect to Start Training at the Exhibition Next Week.

It is expected that the first men will commence training at the Fair Grounds some time next week. The city detachments will be the first to go out, and the rural regiments will follow as rapidly as possible. The men will come in what uniforms the different regiments have in stock, and will be fitted out at the concentration camp.

Quick action on the part of the military authorities led to the arrest at Niagara Falls on Saturday of Paul Jacko, a German reservist, who, with his wife, was attempting to enter the United States. Jacko, it is said, was asked to report to the police to sign the undertaking that he would not attempt to leave the country, as all German and Austrian reservists are required to do. He failed to appear and two officers were sent to an address in Niagara street to place him under arrest. The officers learned that he and his wife had left early Saturday morning in an automobile. The military authorities wired the border cities to keep a lookout, and Jacko was caught in time. He claimed he was going to Buffalo to visit friends. He will be held at Niagara Falls until the military authorities receive a report on the case.

A morning paper declared to-day that 20 Germans and Austrians were brought from Niagara to Stanley Barracks. To be exact, these were brought to Toronto on October 16, and have been safely under guard at Stanley Barracks for one week. The military authorities said none was brought to Toronto Saturday.
