MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—In an application to wind up the affairs of the

Brodeur company, glassware, chiss and hotel supplies, this morning, the practice court was occupied on the novel ground that those applying for winding up the concern are alien enemies of the nation. The application is brought in the name of J. H. Duhamel and is based on a promissory

hamel and is based on a promissory note-signed by A. Brodeur, president of the company, for \$1,52. The company contends that Duhamel, as connected with a local law firm, mersil represents a firm in Bavaria with an agency in New York, through which, it is alleged, the case grose. The company asserts that a settlement as

asked for would redound to the benefit of persons of a nationality now at war with Canada.
