

ALIEN ENEMIES WOULD WIND UP MONTREAL FIRM

Court Is Occupied on Novel Ground When Suit is Begun

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—In an application to wind up the affairs of the Brodeur company, glassware, china and hotel supplies, this morning, the practice court was occupied on the novel ground that those applying for winding up the concern are alien enemies of the nation. The application is brought in the name of J. H. Duhamel and is based on a promissory note, signed by A. Brodeur, president of the company, for \$1,524. The company contends that Duhamel, as connected with a local law firm, merely represents a firm in Bavaria with an agency in New York, through which, it is alleged, the case arose. The company asserts that a settlement as asked for would redound to the benefit of persons of a nationality now at war with Canada.
