

Hoffman, the Spy, Worked in Quebec

He Was on the Draughtsmen's Staff of the Harbor Commission

Quebec, Nov. 18.—Hoffmann, the German spy, who was arrested some days ago by the Winnipeg police, and in whose possession were found plans of the Hudson Bay, worked in Quebec for a few months, up to recently. He was on the draughtsmen's staff of the Harbor Commission.

As soon as the news of his arrest was received here, the authorities awoke to the possibility of his having worked here, in the interest of the German Government, and it was soon learned that he had been a regular customer of Livernois' Photographing Studio, where he had blue prints copied. It is said he paid a particular attention to charts of the River St. Lawrence, of the harbor, and of the various points along the route, and to-day efforts are being made, to materialize these suppositions. Livernois' collection of plates is being investigated to establish the sort of work Hoffman had made there, and it is expected sensational developments may follow.
