marize the evidence given before Magistrate Fraser this morning, and Crown Attorney Cowper, who appeared to prosecute for the crown. Magistrate Fraser, finding no evi-dence against the Sniders junior, or-

dered their dismissal. Joe Snider, the elder, had, he said, however, undoubtediy entered into the conspiracy, and he (the magistrate) had only one course open to him, to commit the man to prison for trial at the spring assizes, the date of "thich is not yet announced. Joe Snider was there-fore conveyed to Welland this after-noon, to be detained in prison until higher court discides whether he is guilty or not guilty of the charge en-tered against him.
