

# GOES UP FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF TREASON

Corporal Paul Mazur of Port Hope Committed in Police Court To-day.

On a charge of high treason against the Empire, Paul Mazur, a young Canadian, born of Austrian parents, was sent up from the Police Court to the Assizes for trial to-day. Mr. W. K. Murphy, jr., accepted the case as counsel for Mazur, and put up the plea that the young fellow was going to visit in the States, and did not deliberately attempt to smuggle the three Austrians out of Canada, as charged by the Crown.

The interesting feature of the case is that Mazur was a corporal in the Canadian Militia, and was acting as interpreter in enrolling the alien enemies at that town. He was caught at Niagara with three Austrians from Port Hope, who said they were Russians. Mazur's parents, who keep a lodging house in Port Hope, were present in court to-day.

Nattily and expensively dressed, Charles R. Smith was remanded a week on a vagrancy charge, covering an investigation into his business here. Incidentally, the Detective Department found a book entitled "The Making of a Spy," of a German make.
