FIRED SALUTE AT "EX." A royal salute was fired on the lake front at the Exhibition camp at

noon to-day in honor of the birthday of Queen Alexandra. Four 12pound guns from Stanley Barracks discharged 21 shots, and the firing party was under command of Major Merritt. Prisoners of war in Stanley Barracks gazed out of the windows and wondered.
