## Germans Talk Too Freely and Get a Warning Many complaints have been laid

recently about the attitude of cer-tain German subjects living to the west of Red Deer, and their expressions about the British Empire. Constables Thompson and Holgate, of the R.N.W.M. Police, consequently spent a few days in the Evarts district, and returned to Red Deer with three men of German birth, F. Geislman, F. Fuchs and Henry Bron, who had been making themselves obnoxious by their expressions. Geisleman

was not proceeded against, but Fuchs was warned that if he repeated the offence he was charged

with, he would be interned, and was then let go. In respect to Bron, he was proved to have served in the 13th infanery of the German army, and discharged on account of having his hand injured while on furlough. He had only been living in Evarts two months. He was sent to Calgary pending further investigation,

with a view to having him interned at Lethbridge. There is no doubt a number of Germans in the district who are taking advantage of our good nature and making a whole lot of seditious statements, and the sooner they are told where they get off at, the better. The Bohemians in the Evergreen district are decidedly different; they are a law-abiding people, satisfied with their conditions, and minding their own business.
