

PAROLES BROKEN; TWO GERMANS ARE HELD IN WINNIPEG

Naturalized Citizen Found With Incriminating Papers in His Possession

WINNIPEG, Jan. 6.—Fred Bringenman, a naturalized German residing at St. James, is at present under arrest as a suspect. Letters of an incriminating nature were found on him when he was under arrest for using threatening language. Immediately these letters were found he was turned over to the military authorities and is now in the guardroom at Fort Osborne barracks. The letters found on him stated that he was endeavoring to find a way to go back to Germany to fight for the Kaiser, and if all else failed he would enlist in a Canadian regiment and get over that way.

Failing to report to the chief of police as instructed and having been given every latitude, Curt Schoenfelt, a German clerk employed in the Bank of Commerce, in this city, was arrested yesterday and will be interned. The military authorities have expressed their determination in this manner to have the paroles upon which German residents of the city are being allowed their freedom kept. It appears that in this particular case parole had been broken before and the parole breaker had been warned. Apparently not appreciating the leniency extended to him, he again failed to report and will now be a prisoner for the duration of the war.
