GEILER TO GET OUT ON PAROLE

Under military escort, Otto Geiler, prisoner of war, was up before Judge Metcalfe today, and was remanded until February 15, when he will be released on parole. In the interim he will be confined at Brandon with others suspected of being enemies of the allies.

Application was made on behalf of Geiler by Lorne J. Elliott a few days ago for a habeas corpus to secure his release. The hearing was remanded until today, when Geiler was produced in court. The arrangement for his release was arrived at between Mr. Elliott, Edward Anderson, K.C., acting for the king, and the military authorities.

Information charging Geiler with treason, the penalty for which is death, had been prepared and read in part: "did assist public enemies at war with his majesty in such war by any means whatsoever." It was laid under Section 68, Sub-section 1 of the Criminal Code.
