

NEW REGISTRAR OF ALIENS BEGINS WORK

Judge Coatsworth Holds Conference With Him in Offices

MORE TO REGISTER

Use of Police May Not be Needed to Hurry Them Up

"I shall crown him at a quarter past ten," said Judge Coatsworth, speaking to The Daily News this morning of Mr. Russell Snow, K.C., his successor to the office of Registrar of Alien Enemies. The coronation, however, said the Judge, would be confidential.

He himself had resigned, he said, simply because on account of court work it was impossible for him to give the registration the attention it demanded. The work there, he continued, was becoming increasingly exacting as, now that the routine work of mere taking names was nearly done, the office would need more specialized judgment in particular cases needing personal attendance at the office on Adelaide street. "I cannot be in two places at once," said the Judge.

Needs More Attention.

He had given the work of the registration office a lot of time and attention, it now needed more than he had given—and more than he could give, he added.

"There are a lot of aliens to register yet," said Captain Wandless, Assistant Registrar, to The Daily News to-day, adding that he knew of some complicated cases personally. These men would have to be looked after, he said.

Police Not Needed.

Asked if the assistance of the police would be called in to enforce registration, Captain Wandless said that the matter had not yet been decided. It would be one of the first things for the new registrar to decide.

Mr. Snow held a long conference with Judge Coatsworth in the Chambers of the latter this morning.
