

TREATED FAIR AT BARRACKS

Richard Ulrich of Mount Dennis
Speaks of His Recent Detention.

Richard Ulrich, Mount Dennis confederator, who was interned in Stanley Barracks without authority, and released yesterday, stated to-day that he did not know at present whether or not he would bring action as the result of his arrest.

Asked if he had been well treated during his stay at the Barracks, he said: "Pretty fairly." He said he took out naturalization papers in the United States in 1904 and has been in Canada nine years. The authorities say that as he has lived here for more than five years he has lost his American citizenship.

Constable C. H. Babbs, of Mount Dennis, said to-day that three months ago, Mr. Ulrich handed over to him a 6-barrel .38-calibre revolver, which the constable still has.

The constable said Ulrich wanted to be on the safe side.

"If some person, other than the magistrate, made a false assertion, leading to Ulrich's detention, Ulrich would be justified in suing the man laying the information," said one K.C. to The Star. "If the magistrate acted on his own observation, and within his own jurisdiction, I do not see that Ulrich could succeed in any claim he might make. Magistrates, when they act in good faith, are protected."
