his political status, the state of Maine today caused Werner Van Horn, alleged bridge oynamiter, to be sentneed to thirty days in the county jall on a charge of damaging property.

Van Horn has appealed to the German ambassador at Washington, Count won. Bernstorff. He told the latter that he had not been on Canadian soil, and asked for protection from extradition to Canada.
