## MR. AND MRS. NERLICH OUT ON \$150,000 BAIL Arrested Yesterday, Charged

With Conspiracy, Following Grand Jury's Finding.

Bail totaling \$150,000 was entered

late yesterday afternoon in the Criminal assizes for Emil Nerlich and his wife, Hedwig, who must

stand their trial in the near future

for "maliciously and traitorously

conspiring, confederating and agree-

conspiring, confederating and agreeing with each other and with
others," to assist one Arthur Zirzow,
to leave the country, and also for
giving information to assist the
enemy and trading with the enemy.
Each of the accused gave \$50,000;
and Henry Nerlich, brother of Emil,
and Hugh Blain, were bondsmen to
the extent of \$40,000 and \$10,000 respectively.

At 3.30 yesterday, in the course of the trial of Paul Mazur for high treason, the Grand Jury returned with two true bills, one against Emil Nerlich alone, for committing high treason, and a second against Mr. and Mrs. Nerlich together, for conspiring to commit the same offence. While Mr. Nerlich had been arraigned in Police Court on the previous charge, the indictment of Mrs. Nerlich came as a complete surprise to the public.

the public. Nerlich had been allowed out Mr. on \$100,000 bail.
On the return of the true bills Mr.
E. E. A. DuVernet, K.C., Crown
Prosecutor, asked that the names of
the two accused be called three times

within and three times without the court, according to custom, and when no answers were received, he

when no answers were received, he immediately requested the issuing of bench warrants. Chief Justice Sir William Mulock consented, and at the same time parties of detectives set out in quest of the couple. Detective Armstrong and County Constable arrested Mr. Nerlich as he

was entering a taxicab at the doors of his place of business on Front street. He was at once taken to the City Hall, arriving in the Assizes at about 4.20 street. about 4.30.

Other detectives arrested Mrs.
Nerlich at the family residence, 16
Dunbar road. She was brought
also to the Assizes, arriving about
an hour after her husband.

Meanwhile Mr. Nerlich had obtained permission to telephone counsel, and Mr. George F. Shepley was
soon on the scene. Application for
bail was granted after the Chief
Justice and Mr. DuVernet had held
a conference.

It is understood that the trial will take place on the 22nd instant.
