the total number of allens belonging to enemy countries paroled or interned in Canada since the outbreak of the war is 30,324. Of these 1,904 have been interned in prison camps and 28,420 have been paroled after registration. The figure given by provinces as to registration are as follows: Quebec, 8,845; Ontario, 7,571 New Brunswick, 5,200; Nova Scotia, 1,300 Manitoba, 5,521; Saskatchewan, 1,416; Alberta, 2.250; British Columbia, 1.320 Yukon, 55.
