

MACHINE GUN FORCE IS NOW COMPLETE

Twenty-five Students Enrolled
in One Day

ALL GOOD ATHLETES

Night Tactics on Wednesday Reported
to Have Been Very Successful —
Q.O.R. to Have Church Parade on
Sunday.

After a very short period of organization, considering the magnitude of the work, the new Motor Machine Gun Battery is up to strength. A contingent of 25 University men joined yesterday, filling up every vacant place. In addition to their being nearly all athletes, these men are students of the School of Practical Science and the Engineering School. Yesterday the battery received a new wireless outfit for attachment to the cars. It is understood that this outfit will be used for establishing communication between moving cars, experiments in which methods of signalling have produced definite results.

Meningitis Patient Doing Well.

Private Arthur Smith, who is suffering from a form of meningitis, is maintaining reasonable progress towards recovery. No decisive turn has yet been noted, but indications point to a recovery.

The dental clinic, after over two months' work, will be closed after February 27. The entire camp will have been treated by that date, and the results are declared by the medical authorities to be highly satisfactory. It is intimated that no further liability in respect of dental treatment will be incurred at public expense, and N.C.O.'s are ordered to see that all men requiring treatment visit the dentists before February 27.

Learned Much by Tactics.

"As a whole, the night tactics on Wednesday were successful," said Major R. C. Bickford, G.S.O., yesterday. "The tactics were carried out under great difficulties. The ground was covered with snow, the surface of which was frozen hard and gave way with a crackling sound under the men's feet. In addition, the light background threw the moving columns into relief and discovered their presence several hundred yards farther from the enemy than would ordinarily have been the case."
