#### GERMAN RACING HAS AN IMPOSING PROGRAM.

The last issue to hand of Deutscher Sport, that of January 31, contains several interesting items of information. Imprimis it mentions that the well-known Hungarian jockey, G. Janak, who rode in this country on various occasions a few years ago, is on

active service with the 1st Honved Hussar Regiment, as are also the two other Austrian jockeys, E. Protzner and J. Fries. East Prussia is lamenting the disappearance of a number of stallions and other horses, which were left behind at the Lankischken remount stud when it became necessary to flee from the advancing Russians, who are credited with having annexed them. The list of racing fixtures in Germany, according to the table published in our contemporary, begins on March 7 with the meeting at Rathenow, followed on March 14 by Berlin-Strausberg, and on March 28 by Berlin-Karlshorst. The list makes an imposing show. Whether a commencement will be made on the date fixed is not clear, and opinions as to the advisability of "carrying on as usual" vary considerably. Some of the numerous owners and others canvassed by Deutscher Sport have replied in the affirmative, but others, while agreed that racing should take place, suggest that the start should be postponed for a while, and others again deprecate the idea of horse racing at so grave a time.

Among those that consider the sport ought certainly not to be allowed to lapse is Count C. Lehndorff-Steinort, who says that "in his idea breeders' races for two and three-year-olds and eventually also for four-year-old colts and fillies should certainly be held." He adds that "the starter and the judge will suffice," implying that other spectators of the races will not be required. The idea of a race meeting confined to the horses (and presumably their jockeys), the starter and the judge is novel. As the Count makes no mention of trainers, stable lads, stewards or other racing officials, one would fancy from his letter that the jockeys would have to saddle their own mounts and apparently weigh themselves out and in, in addition to taking the horses to and from the meetings. As some of the jockeys are no doubt serving with the colors in similar fashion to their Austro-Hungarian confreres, I am afraid that the racing as advocated by the Count would be rather bewildering—"Vigilant," in London Sportsman of February 8.

#### ALIEN ENEMY'S HORSES SOLD.

The horses in training, the property of Prince Kinsky, who is an Austrian subject, were sold at public auction by Messrs. Tattersall at Knightsbridge, London, on Monday, February 22, under a license granted by the Secretary of State for Home Affairs. The proceeds of the sale, after deducting forfeits already paid on behalf of Prince Kinsky, are to be handed over to the public trustee, to be dealt with by him as if they were a share of profits paid to him as custodian under section 2 of the trading with the enemy act, 1914.
