They are a peace-loving, very intellectual, and highly cultured people. War Unpopular. She saw Bohemian troops leave for

Kaiser Wilhelm is held entirely responsible for the war by all the Bohemians with whom Miss Cross discussed the matter. The feeling :: much more bitter-towards him than towards any one other individual in any of the countries at war.
