Enemy Aliens in Porcupine District
The Porcupine Herald, published at South
Porcupine, in its issue of March 13, contains several items of news which indicate that there is
some disquiet in that region because of the
number of aliens there and the attitude they as-

"The foreign population of the Porcupine district," says the Herald, "far outnumber the British, and even at that some of our best men have gone to the front." Enemy aliens are employed in the mines and, according to the Herald, "some \$40,000, or \$50,000 leaves this camp each and every month to German bankers in New York to

be forwarded to Austria and Germany." The Herald calls upon the Ottawa Government to take cognizance of this, and declares that patriotic local feeling is much disturbed.

A public meeting of citizens was held at Golden City, with representatives from outside points, and a committee of seven appointed to organize a Home Guard. It is described as be-

fend itself, if need be, against a local majority, consisting of enemy aliens.

In the same issue of the paper is recorded the arrest of three German-Poles charged with stealing dynamite from the Nipissing mine and attempting to blow up a magazine containing 129 cases of dynamite. A report of these arrests appeared in despatches to the Toronto press.
