## REGISTERED ALIEN ENEMIES AT CALGARY

Supt. Pennycather of the R.N.W.M. P., arrived in the city last night to take charge of "K" Division.

Supt. P. W. Pennycather is one of the oldtimers of the west. Joining the force at Calgary on March 16, 1885, he has been stationed at many points in all the western provinces in his thirty years' service. Superintendent Pennycather was stationed at Griffon Lake near Farwell (now Revelstoke) under Col. Steele at the time the C. P. R. was under construction there. He was moved to Banff, where he remained for a short time. After being stationed at Gleichen he was transferred to Regina where he remained for 18 months, being made Corporal. In 1890 he was promoted to Sergeant and moved to Deloraine, Manitoba. Three years later he was married and the same year was made Sergeant-Major. After being stationed at Battleford for three years he was transferred to Macleod and a year later went to the Yukon, where he was stationed at Whitehorse. As this was the year following the big gold rush he can tell of many exciting experiences of the northland. He knew Robt. W. Service intimately. In 1904 he was made Inspector and transferred to Prince Albert in 1906. Three years ago he was moved to Macleod for the second time. Last November Superintendent Pennycather was appointed registrar of alien enemies at Calgary, and all loose Germans being safely rounded up, he was appointed to succeed Superintendent Wilson here, commencing April 1st.

Supt. Pennycather knows this country like a book, and in an interview this morning expressed complete confidence in it as the richest country in the world. He declared that the south country was floating on a sea of oil and predicted great development in this industry.

Supt. Pennycather is a brother-in-law of Mr. Pennycather of the C.P.R., who was stationed at Macleod and Cranbrook and was well known locally.
