

# RELEASED FROM INTERNMENT

After repeated applications to the Registrar of alien enemies for his release from internment, Paul Jekel was released. On March 25 permission was given for his release by Gen. Sir Ian Hamilton, commanding officer of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, and the Registrar changed the order for the reporting to be done semi-monthly. Jekel agreed to the condition, and the Registrar changed the order for the reporting to be done monthly. Jekel was informed soon after his release declared, as it was believed by the Canadian government, that he was destined to obtain his signature to an understanding Jekel failed to sign, and the next morning he left Toronto for the United States in company with a woman who claimed to be his wife. Information had been given to believe that Jekel's wife had gone to Brazil to Germany, and he had settled in Niagara Falls and subsequently went to Kingston. Later he was transferred to Stanley Prisoner of War Camp at Terre-Blanche. When issued the permit Jekel was warned that in the event of his failing to report he would immediately be arrested.
