
VANCOUVER GERMANS HELD IN DETENTION

POLICE BELIEVE PROMINENT CITIZENS CELEBRATED THE GERMAN ADVANCE.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Vancouver, B.C., April 30.—Four prominent German residents of Vancouver were arrested yesterday because the police believe that on Sunday night they, with a number of other compatriots, engaged in a celebration of the German advance against Canadian troops at Ypres. A very heavy casualty list of Vancouver men killed and wounded reached Vancouver Sunday night, and it was an unlucky time for the Germans to celebrate anything.

The men detained are: Paul Koopf, a capitalist; Baron Von Luttwitz, a relative and intimate friend of the Kaiser; Dr. Otto Grunert and Frederick Stritzel.

DE REUTER'S SUCCESSOR.
