

JUDGE FELT TOO STRONGLY

So Postponed Sentencing Alberta German For Treason.

Calgary, Alta., May 12.—Fritz Thaden, a German settler of the Huszar colony, was found guilty of aiding one, Von Wissman, an officer in the German army, by sending him boxes which contained arms after war had been declared between Britain and Germany. Justice Walsh, who delivered judgment, found him not guilty of aiding one Krull, a German reservist to return to Germany. In postponing sentence until Friday, May 21st the judge said he did so because he desired that the man should be punished for the offence committed and for that alone, and that he felt so strongly over the unspeakable infamy of the prisoner's fellow countrymen in sinking the Lusitania that he thought he should not sentence him there and then. "I am administering British justice in the British court," said His Lordship, "and I do not wish a suspicion or revenge for that awful brutality to be connected with the sentence I shall give this man."
