London, May 13.—"It is not likely even now that the Government will take the bold course of interning ev-

ery male enemy allen of military age," says the Times, which declares the cases will be considered on their merits, and it is understood that no new measures will be taken against naturalized Germans and Austrians.

"The position of many of these men, some highly placed, is the crux of a new situation, with which the nation is confronted," says the Times, "Changes in law would be needed to discriminate against those who are legally British citizens, and the Government does not intend to introduce any fresh legislation on this subject."

Rain Disperses Crowds.

A heavy downpour of rain early to-day dispersed anti-German mobs that ran amuck all over London during the night, defying the police. Following a night of terror, frightened German residents to-day were barricaded in their homes in many districts. Strict orders were given the police to use drastic means to prevent a repetition of the riotous scenes, and the authorities promised severe punishment for the mob leaders arrested last night.

The first case of an inn being looted occurred in the Blackfriars district of London last night when a mob attacked the Crown Inn near St. George's Church, turned the German landlord into the street, and helped themselves to liquor. A small deachment of police was helpless against the big crowd.

In Lambeth, Kennington, and Wood Green—in fact in virtually all the poorer districts of the metropolis—shops belonging to allens of enemy countries, or of British subjects of German descent, were wrecked and their contents thrown into the street. Many arrests were made.

Later in the day rioting broke out again in certain parts of the city. A German owned public house in Cannington was raided by a mob and partially wrecked.

Several fires were discovered in sections peopled largely by Germans to-day. During the night many German over halls and shops were wrecked.

The worst riot last night occurred in the Camden Town district, extending from King's Cross northward. It is estimated that in this district at least 150 shops were damaged.

Anti-German demonstrations virtually ceased at Liverpoor and Manchester last night. Two hundred shops were damaged in Liverpool during the disturbances. Rioting in Glasgow has not been serious, although feeling runs high.
