BRANDON DISTRICT SURE TO SUPPLY **QUOTA OF RECRUITS** Several Hundred Men May Be

Asked for the New Overseas Contingent 99TH SUPPLY GUARDS

Col. Clark Wants More Men To Release Members of the 45th

Battalion Still Here "Yes, I suppose it will mean a fur-

ther call for several hundred men from the Brandon district," said Col. F. J. Clark, when interviewed this morning in regard to the call to Canadians for thirty-five thousand more

men for active service. Col. Clark is busy getting the 99th regiment into efficient shape so that it can take ov-

er the complete work of looking after the interned aliens. He wants to see the remainder of the 45th men down at Sewell so that their training can proceed along more uniform lines. When asked how the recruiting was progressing, the Colonel said the

numbers were very satisfactory, but there was still room for more young men. He was very preased indeed to see five Brandon firemen and one police officer joining the regiment which he is to command and which is known as the City of Brandon regi-

ment. As to future regiments here, the Colonel said it was obvious that there would have to be more men called from such a populous centre as the

Brandon district. He was very proud of the response the Brandon district had made up to the present time and he looked for a continuance of this patriotic offering. He mentioned that the Brandon district had sent over a thousand men either to the front or to the training camps already, and when the time came he knew there were men here who would come for-

ward and offer themselves at great personal sacrifice just the same as others had done when the call came for the first contingent. The Colonel agreed that the Brandon district had done as well as any place in the whole Dominion.
