LOOKED UPON AS SPY A SOLDIER BETTGE HELD IN BARREFFELD CAMP, When Intoxicated He Told What

Germany Would Do to the Allies— His Case Being Enquired Into.

There is a man in one of the units in Barriefield camp who is suspected

of being a German spy, and his down. fall came through imbling too free. ly. Some time ago this man-crossed from the United States to Brockville, but was immediately deported as an undestrable. A tew weeks later he was successful in avading

the immigration officers, and he promptly enlisted for overseas service with the infanty.

No suspicion was attached to the man up to a few days ago, when he came to the city, and had to be car-

ried back to the camp. In the guard room he kept telling his companions what Germany could and was going to do, and that there was no hope for the Allies. Then some one "smashed him' so thoroughly that the foreigner did not wake up until next morning."

When brought up before Ms commanding officer, he denied all knowledge of having expressed pro-Ger man views, but nevertheless he was kept as a prisoner. It is understood that the case has been submitted to both the American and Cana-

ted to both the American and Canadian governments, who are considering what action will be taken, but in the meantime he is looked upon as being the first suy in Barrifield camp.
