SAYS PRISONERS ARE VERY WELL TREATED

Have Commodious Living and Sleeping Quarters, and Food is all Right

Mr. and Mrs. G. Franks, 908 Easter-day avenue, Soo, Mich., have received a letter from their son, Pte. A. G. Franks, dated April 30th, in which he says:

"I suppose by now you will know I am a prisoner of war along with 26 Soo boys. They treat us fine. We are interned in a barracks, a long wooden building, electric lighted and lots of windows for light and air. We have mattresses, counterpanes, sheets, blanket and pillow. Our routine is:-- 6.00 a. m., reveille, 7 breakfast, coffee, 9, roll call and one hour exercise, 12 dinner of stew and its generally a good one too, 5 p. m. roll call, 6 supper of soup and our ration of brown bread, we bath and do our washing once a week. We are not allowed to say anything about the war, so you will have to wait till I come home for me to tell you about our terrible fight, and believe me it was awful.
