Mr and Mr G Franks, 908 Easterday avenue, Soo, Mich, have received a letter from their son, Ptc A. G Franks, dated-April 20th, in which he says: "I suppose by now you will know

I am a prisoner of war along with 26 Soo hoys. They treat us fine. We are interned in a barracks, a long wooden building, electric lighted and loke of windows for light and air. We have mattresses, counterpanes, sheets branker and pillow. Our routine is:

branker and pi.ow. Our routine Isra-6,00 a.m., reveille, 7 breakfust, colle-9, roll call#and one hour exercise 12 dinner of stew and its generally a good one too, 5 p. m roll call. (supper of s.up and our ration of below bread, we bath and do our washing bread, we bath and do our washing

once a week. We are not allowed to say anything about the war, so you will have to wall till I come home for me to tell you about our terrible fight, and helter me it was swill, Below are the names of the Soo boys here.
