The damage done by explosives to a factory at Walkerville and the attempt to blow up the Armories at Windsor, in which many soldiers were sleeping, warns all Canada at comparative-

ly small cost that it will be necessary to guard against such attacks as these which may be attempted by individual criminals from across the border. There is need for vigilance around all camps, armories, and factories where munitions of war

are being produced. There is with people in this country a free and easy confidence that nothing out of the ordinary is going to happen. But the times are not normal, and there are enemy allens in the United States who have abundantly the will to do this country, or anybody in it, any

possible injury. If criminal acts are committed by dynamiters it will go hard with those who perform these acts and those who, from the shelter of a friendly State, inspire them. With two Governments working together to prevent lawlessness and ferret out the sources from which it comes, there cannot be much of it without exposures, arrests and exemplary publish-

ments. Germany has a very elaborate system, not

only of espionage, but of secret agents, whose work is destruction. They are carrying on war in Canada as in other countries hostile to Germany, and must be met with the same vigilance and determination as Germans in France. epportunity is thus offered to many who are willing to help and are not available for service in the field. No expense should be spared in

providing this very important protection for the

sinews of war.
