PRISONER OF WAR SLAIN BY GUARD

Four Others Injured When Mutiny Occurs in Internment Camp.

AMHERST, N. S., June 25—Yesterday for the first time since the internment of the prisoners of war here, they became mutinous and as a result one of them was shot dead. The official story is as follows:

"While the prisoners of war were being conducted to the compound for physical exercise, one of them, Fritz Clause by name, assaulted one of the I. C. police knocking him insensible.

"The guard was called out to quell the mutiny and in the melee which followed, the original instigator was shot dead and four others of the prisoners more or less seriously injured.

"For some days signs of trouble have been noticed so that while the attack was sudden the guards showed wonderful promptness in quelling the insubordination. Over 700 Germans and Austrians are interned or under a guard of 180."
