lane so long that they thought they owned it and would not let others drive or walk through it. One cannot tell without having all the facts what warrant there may have been for preventting those men pitching horseshoes in that lane.

But the bald report of the police court proceedings leaves all who read about it quite uninformed There are many uses to which streets and lanes may not be put. The by-laws regulate all that. But one would suppose that there might

be a lane wherein men could pitch horseshoes

a fuss about it.
