are less than 50 owing allegiance to

the Ottoman empire. The balance is

composed of Germans. In addition to the large numbers proceeding on farm work, large gangs left for Saskatoon, Moose Jaw and Edmonton on railroad employment.

One of the first results of the great trek of allens will be the decrease in the number of men reporting to the police at Rupert street, where on busy days over 600 men have re-

ported.
