

ADMITTS BREAKING LAW: SAYS PLAYED DOUBLE GAME

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Windsor, Aug. 13.—William Lonnee of this city, charged with assisting alien enemies of the Empire to get out of the country, before County Judge Dromgois in Sandwich Court this afternoon admitted calmly that he had broken the laws both of Canada and the United States, and that he was fully aware of what he was doing. Lonnee told the court that he took money from four Austrians, in return for which he was to aid them in getting into the United States. Then he gave information to the Canadian immigration authorities, which led to the arrest of the foreigners.

With Lonnee were also arraigned Victor Caron and Max Lakrytch, indicted jointly for the same offence as Lonnee. Caron's defence was that he "had been hired by Lonnee to take some foreigners across the river." For this service he received \$1. Lakrytch, who is a Jew, pleaded not guilty.

After hearing all the evidence, including that of United States Immigration Officer McCabe, the court announced that its decision in all three cases would be reserved until Monday.

Judge Dromgois took occasion to comment sharply on the practice of certain citizens of Windsor in breaking the laws of a friendly nation. "Men who have been engaged in such practices need expect little consideration from this court," he said.

INDIAN DIVER'S DEATH.

Amherstburg, Ont., Aug. 12.—Joe Cadaret, engineer for the Mullen Coal Company, found in the river opposite the company's dock this afternoon the body of Arthur Kywash, an Indian diver, twenty-seven years old, who disappeared Tuesday after drawing two months' wages from Captain Fred Trotter. He was a son of Adam Kywash, also a diver. The man's head was badly bruised, and little money was found on him. Coroner Fred Park is investigating.
