INDIA TO SEND AWAY THE ALIEN ENEMIES

FOR OWN AND EMPIRE'S SAFETY THEY WILL BE REPATRIATED, GOVERNMENT SAYS.

London, Aug. 15.—The Government of India, according to a special
despatch from Simia, has been
obliged to adopt more drastic measures in the treatment of
enemies throughout the Empire. The
despatch says:

"A statement describing in detail the measures for internment, surveillance and registration hitherto applied to allen enemies in India has been issued by the Government. It states that the prolongation of the war and the hitterness aroused by German savagery have now altered the position, besides adding to the continued strain of supervision. It has accordingly been decided, with the opprovation of the Secretary of State for India, to repatriate all women, children and men of non-military age as soon as the necessary arrangements can be carried out."

LAD DROWNED NEAR LUCKNOW,

Went Bathing in Deep Water, Though Unable to Swim.

Lucknow, Aug. 15 .- About noon today Charlie Lochart, sixteen years of age, second son of Ezekiel Lochart, 4th Concession, Kinloss, lost his life in Purvis' Lake, about two from town. Young Lochart, accompanied by a young English lad, neither of whom could swim, had gone to the lake with the intention of having a bath. Lochart was the first to enter the water, going down in about ten feet. When he did not rise to the surface after a considerable length of time his companion became alarmed, and rushed to the home of a farmer not far distant, but the body was not recovered till about 2.30, being in the water more than two hours. doctors worked over him for some time, but life was extinct. The funeral will be held on Tuesday.
