## ARE WE TOO EASY?

The news that Canadian prisoners are being put under specially hard treatment in Germany once more brings up the question of the treatment of Austrian and German prisoners in Canada. It is evident that the charge upon which Germans have changed their treatment of Canadian prisoners—namely allega<sub>r</sub> tions concerning treatment of German prisoners at Amherst, N.S.-is unfounded. The state department at Washington, which is charged with the care of German interests in Canada, practically denies it. In this, as in other instances, the Germans have simply followed their usual principle of making a bold charge against another nation, and on the charge, without proof, instituting reprisals. Contrast this German attitude towrds Canadians with our Canadian attitude towards Germans. It somehow and sometimes would seem to
