And Employment If it be argued that the question of immigration should beleft till after the war, reply may be made that in June the Canadian Pacific Railway sold - more farms to bona fide settlers of high quality from the United States than in any previous month since June, 1912. This shows that the population can

be got even in war time if it is gone after in the right way. The Dominion must have louble its present population before it can use its huge transpogtation plant on land and water to full advantage. Every new contingent of immigrants, if directed to the land, and kept there till they become self-supporting, will assist materially in lifting the country to a full realization of its econ-

omic potentialities. But for the present the pressing need is to employ the unemployed-if possible-and anyway, as far as

possible on the land. . .
